COST-SAVING OPPORTUNITY FOR YOU!

Row River River Valley Community Partnership (formerly known as Row River Fire Response) has secured funding to help Row River area residents with creating Defensible Space around their homes. They have already begun the process with 30 homes, an impressive endeavor in under a year!

This funding pays for crews to come to your property and support your mitigation plans. Once you complete our assessment process we will schedule a team to come work with you on your property. Row River Valley Community partnership (RRVCP) has been able to provide chipping, tree thinning, branch removal, and more. These chips can be used in your garden, and the wood is sawn into rounds for firewood.

RRVCP is offering free defensible space clearing for interested homeowners.

This program is voluntary, and filling out a Homeowner Interest form places you on our list to be considered for funding, we cannot guarantee funding for all applicants this year, your information will be kept for future opportunities.

How it Works

- Complete the Interest Form. There's no obligation, and it takes just a few minutes.
- We'll Contact You. Once selected, we'll reach out to schedule an assessment.
- Stay on the List. If we can't assist this year, you'll remain on our list for future funding.

Q: WHAT IS WILDFIRE MITIGATION?

A: Wildfire mitigation is a set of actions taken before a wildfire to reduce its impact.

These actions include

Defensible Space: Maintaining the landscape around on a property to reduce the risk of fire.

Home Hardening: Making a home more resistant to fire.

Fuel Reduction: Reducing the amount of fuel available for fire

Fire Resistant Materials: using fire resistant materials in construction.

Ladder Fuels: live or dead vegetation that allows a fire to climb from the ground into a tree.

Fire-Safe Landscaping: Designing landscapes to minimize the spread of fire.



COMMUNITY GATHERING

February 2, at the Dorena School, around 90 community members gathered to learn about defensible space, emergency services, and home hardening initiatives in our valley.

Reta Cochrane, RRFR/RRVCP Board President, introduced Kelsey Hunter, a Fire Reduction Specialist from the Oregon State Fire Marshall, who shared an informative presentation about ways to make our homes safer in the event of wildfire.

Row River Rural Fire Protection District (RRRFPD) Board President Sue Brown let us know all about the new tools available as a part of the new fire district, such as a defibrillator. She also congratulated the community on the new sign marking the home of the coming fire station.

Kathleen Istudor, the RRFR/RRVCP Executive Director, encouraged community members to sign the Homeowner Interest form getting people on the list for Defensible Space funding. The RRFR board is pleased with the growing list of people, an encouraging sign for improved fire safety in our valley.



Raffle: everyone's a winner

Thanks to donations from the Book Mine, Log House Plants, Cascade Home and more, the community meeting was also able to offer prizes to attendees. Full size fire extinguishers, fire blankets, emergency lights, creosote packs, and hand-cranked radios were just a few of the items people won in the raffle.

Delicious cookies and a variety of pizzas were also given out, making for a warm and friendly event.

The RRFR board, Row River Rural Fire Protection District, and OSFM for hosted this community meeting.

Kelsey Hunter, Fire Reduction Specialist (pictured, right) from the Oregon State Fire Marshall taught us ways to make one's home and property less susceptible to wildfire.

She informed us that embers are an important consideration, as wind can cause embers to come to rest under porches, and in gutters, so it is important to keep those areas free from fuels. It is also important to keep fuels, such as woodpiles, away from ones home. We learned about ladder fuels, and the volatility of certain trees.

The OSFM has an informative website and Kelsey is available to answer questions about defensible measures that can help defend one's home from wildfires.

Survey Teams Coming Around

RRVCP and Lane County are applying for a Community Development Block Grant **to build and outfit a new fire station for firefighters, firetrucks, and all equipment for Row River Rural Fire Protection District.**

As a part of the application, we need to provide the State of Oregon with a current estimate of the average income of the residents in our service area. Row River Fire Response is working with Portland State University (PSU) to train local community members who will be going door-to-door to obtain this information.

What will happen?

- PSU has randomly selected a subset of residents for efficiency.
- PSU has been training interested local volunteers in how to confidentially collect information.

- Trained volunteers from the Row River community will visit the selected households so everyone selected has a chance to participate.
- The survey is voluntary and will only take two minutes to complete.
- **The survey is completely CONFIDENTIAL.** That means your name will not be tied to your answers in any way and you don't write your name on the survey or the return envelope.

Your participation in the survey is extremely valuable and important so we can support everyone in our community.

To better reflect our broader mission and to avoid confusion with the new fire department we have officially changed our name to **Row River Valley Community Partnership. (RRVCP)**

Our organization remains committed to supporting the Row River Rural Fire Protection District (RRFPD) by securing funding for vital resources such as fire stations, large equipment, and other essential needs.

Thanks to a generous private donor, we now have a centrally located property on Row River Road near the Little White Church designated for the district's main Fire station. Several necessary permits and studies for the site have already been approved.

GOOD NEWS!

YOU MAY QUALIFY FOR INSURANCE SAVINGS

During a recent Public Protection Classification Survey in the Row River Valley area, ISO (International Organization for Standardization) has completed its analysis of the structural fire suppression delivery system provided in your community. The resulting classification is indicated below:

New Rating: 8B

Effective June 1, 2025

The fire department can provide effective fire suppression through tanker shuttles, drafting from static sources, or other alternative water supply methods.

Each insurance company determines the premium it charges their policy holders. The way the insurer uses ISO's information on public fire protection may depend on several things – the company's fire-loss experience, ratemaking methodology, underwriting guidelines, and its marketing strategy.

This new rating means all residents located within 5 miles of our temporary main fire station (located at: 75976 Booth Kelly Camp Road), **will have the opportunity to shop for lower rates.** This will cover over 80% of the fire district. The district, along with community members, are working hard to reach the remaining 20%. 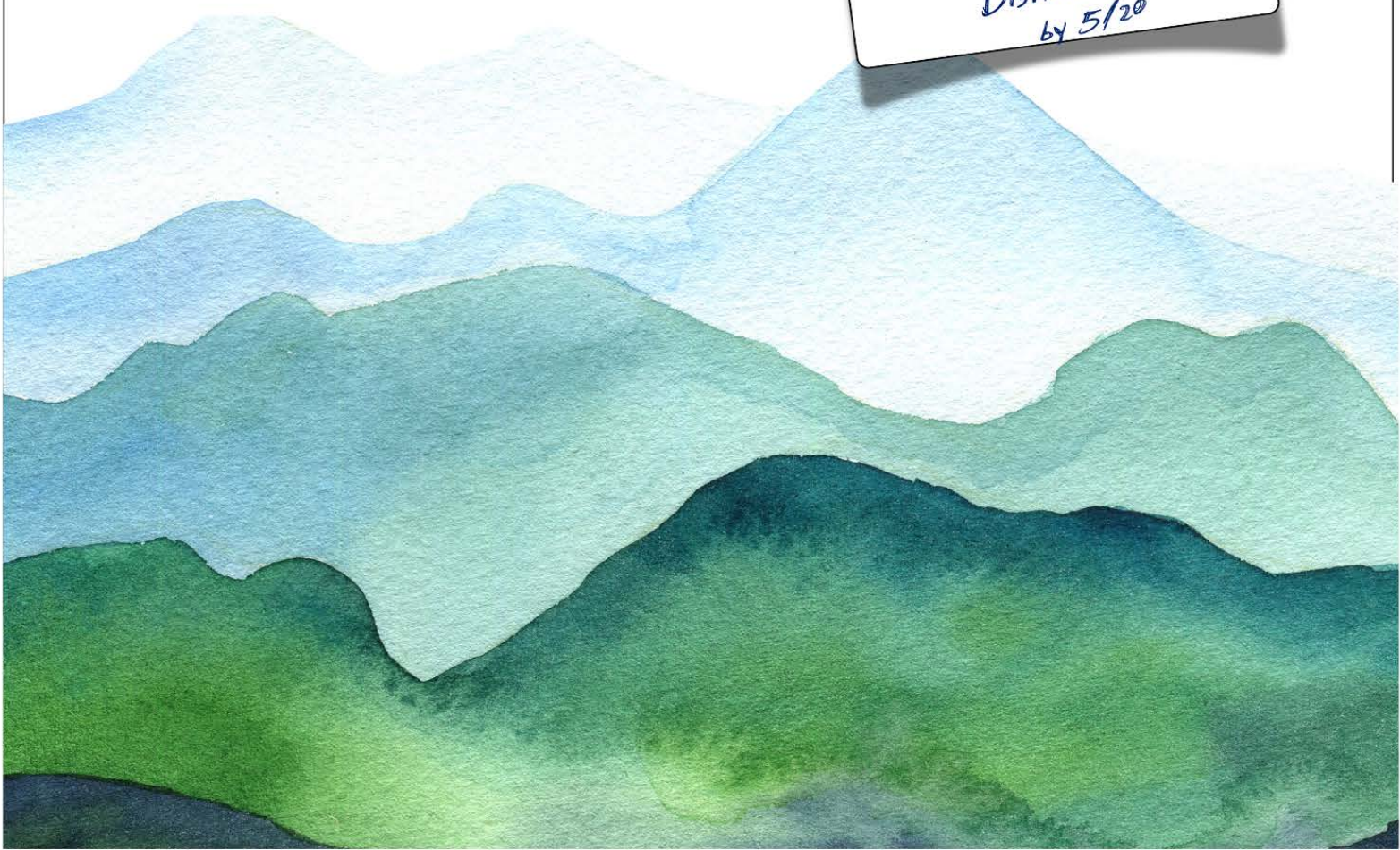

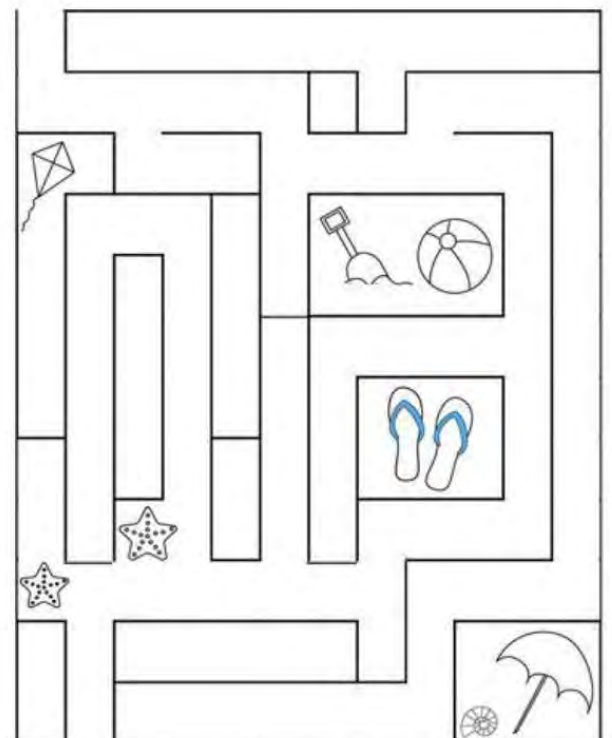
The Club meets on the first Wednesday of each month, at 10 am at the Row River Community Church. All are welcome.

Row River Valley Fun Facts



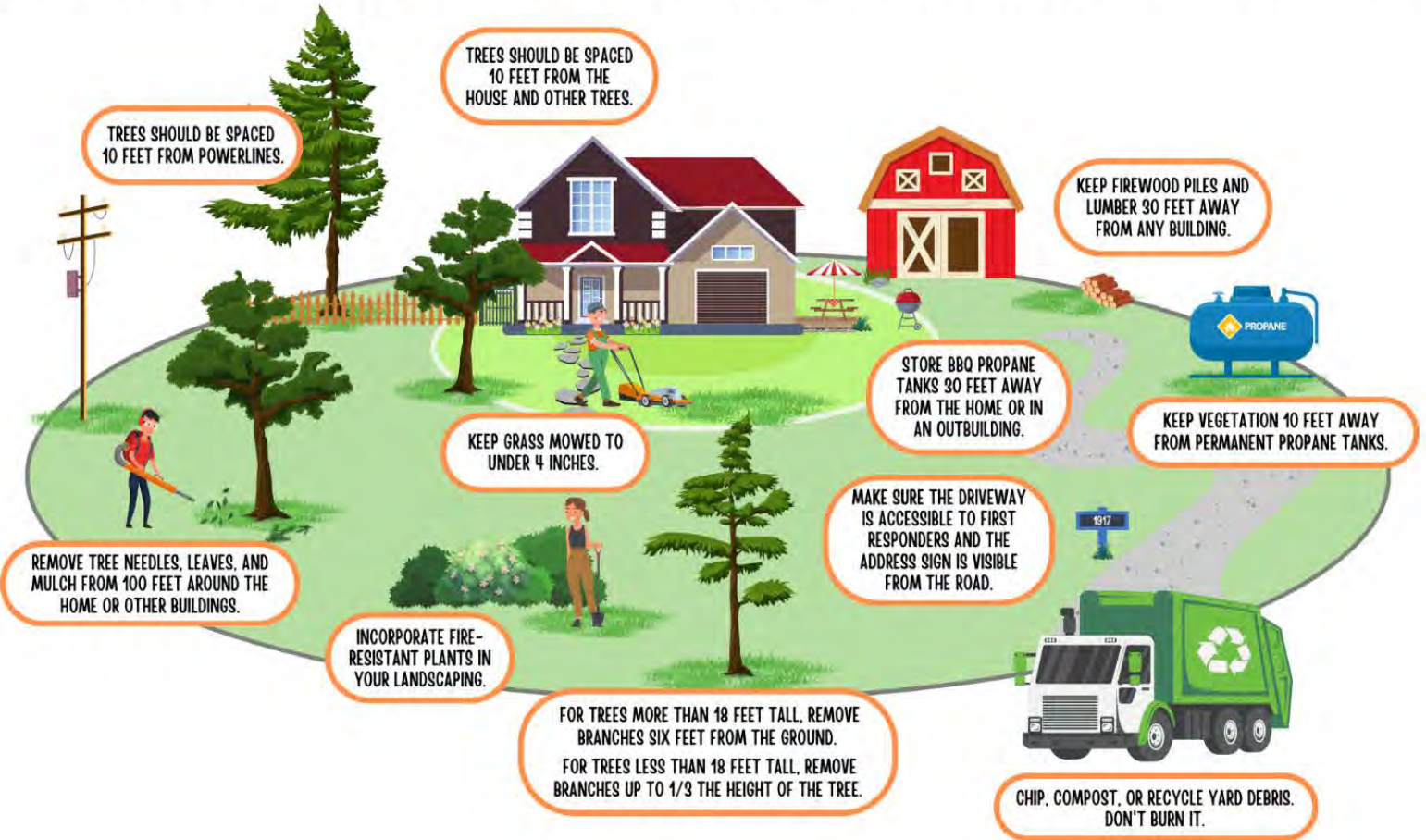
- The Row River area has **500 homes and 1,200 residents**
- **The Row River, a vital tributary of the Coast Fork Willamette Watershed** supports the drinking water supply for Cottage Grove and contributes to the broader Willamette Watershed, which serves major cities to the North of us.
- **Animals** including elk, deer, black bear, and cougar, as well as smaller residents like squirrels, fox, raccoons, and bats **are supported by the valley's diverse habitat.** 236 bird species, including raptors such as owls, eagles, osprey, and even peregrine falcons, can occasionally be seen soaring above the trees.
